t's Winter Review time! As we pass through the sixth month of the "academic" year, we will be sending home a synopsis of your child's developmental progress, as observed here at Kid Country. Our teachers are continually assessing your children during their play and recording their observations. We then review their progress to help develop our lesson plans to the needs of the children in the class. We are able to easily identify those that need a little more encouragement to meet the next developmental milestone along with those that need more challenging activities to keep them progressing.

The Winter Review that you will receive is our observations to date of your child's progress. We are observing your child in the five domains of social-emotional, physical, language, cognitive and literacy development. There is a total of 38 objectives contained within those areas! We can show your child's progress in any area from the time he/she enrolled at Kid Country. This cumulative data is very beneficial as we check to make sure your child is hitting all the developmental milestones.

We will be offering formal parent/teacher conferences in May, but if you would like to speak one-on-one with our child's teachers before that, please reach out and we will get a meeting scheduled! We are always available to meet with you to discuss progress or discuss concerns, just let us know and we will make it happen.

We are also conducting our annual registration process. Every family has received a registration packet for Summer 2020 and Fall 2020-21. Be sure to turn your papers in by February 7 to reserve your child's spots at Kid Country.

Our Valentine Day parties will be held on Friday, February 14. The children are always excited for these special party days and we thank you for making them so special by volunteering and donating the needed items for the parties! GREEN FROGS

In the Green Frogs classroom, we spent the month of January learning about the Arctic. We began by learning about the weather and climate. We learned that people that live in the Arctic live in igloos that are made of ice. Frogs painted igloos using legos and "stamping" the ice pattern to the igloo. The children then used the other side of the lego to "stamp" snow onto the Arctic scene. These paintings are used to decorate the snow slopes that are on the walls in our room! We also learned about icebergs, and saw first-hand how they float in the water, but that most of the ice remains under the water.

While talking about the weather, we talked about the different clothing that

people wear when it is cold outside. The Green Frogs listed all of the things that keep you warm and dry. We learned how to say hats (gorras), gloves (guantes), boots (botas), and scarf (bufanda) in Spanish! We practiced these words by dressing up and having relay races in the hallway!! Other words to ask your

child about are "chico" (boy) and "chica"(girl).

Next, we learned about the animals of the Arctic. It is hard to realize how big Polar Bears actually are, so to bring it more to our life, the Green Frogs put their little foot print inside of a big Polar Bear print to see the difference. Wow! Polar Bears are BIG!!! Green Frogs also enjoyed painting Polar Bears white using stencils, pom-poms and glitter.

The Green Frogs loved learning about penguins, waddling around the classroom and learning that even with wings, they don't fly. They made penguins out of construction paper and googly eyes, working on their cutting fine motor skills. We also went to the Arctic as scientists! Animals were frozen in ice and we used different salt and water to spray and break the animals out of the ice.

We are excited to see what other wonders and unique animals the Arctic has to show us next!

us motivation to explore it more through talking about air temperatures and surface temperatures. While talking about temperatures we learned that higher temperatures needed bigger numbers, while lower temperatures needed smaller numbers, allowing us to expand our number vocabulary.

As we continued with our Winter study, we spent time discussing the different things
