GREEN FROGS

We wrapped up our first official study in the Green Frogs room this month. As we took time to get to know one another, we also spent time getting to know our shapes and colors. Fine motor stamping fun was the focus as we began our study discussing circles and semi-circles. The Frogs had a blast hunting around the room for toys that could be used as stampers and enjoyed exploring with semi-circles to find that two semi-circles put together creates a full circle. As we moved on to squares and rectangles, the Frogs let their imaginations run wild as

they participated in shape free art. Using rectangles and squares in various sizes and colors, the Frogs made robots, animals, and even people.

With the discussion of diamonds and triangles, came memories of summer kite flying for many of the Green Frogs. Using four small triangles, the children were able to create a large diamond that looked exactly like a kite! Sticky contact paper is always a favorite in the Green Frogs room and our Frog friends truly enjoyed sticking small, colorful pieces of tissue paper onto their contact paper to create beautiful sun-catcher kites to fly inside of our classroom.

The final three shapes that we discussed allowed for more fine-motor practice! We created our starry night sky stamp art after discussing the things that we see in the sky at nighttime. Our name hearts put our cutting skills to the test as the Frogs were tasked with cutting along several straight lines to separate the letters of their names. Once the letters were separated, we worked on letter identification as the Frogs were challenged

to put them back in the proper order.
Finally came our favorite shape, the oval!
The Green Frogs giggled with delight as they
pretended to be Humpty Dumpty (the oval
egg) and topple off of our block walfs.

In addition to fun art projects and discussions, we have been incorporating shapes into our daily play in interest areas. In cars and blocks, the teachers are

encouraging the Frogs to identify the shapes they are using to build structures as well as encouraging them to use shapes in new ways. In manipulatives, the Frogs are using small shape blocks to build larger and more complex pictures and scenes.

YELLOW DUCKS

The Yellow Ducks' had a very musical September filled with a variety of musical expressions. Music is a great way for children to express themselves while utilizing their gross motor skills. The Yellow

Ducks used their upper body to explore the large floor drum.

The large floor drum benefits social skills, rhythm exploration, and movement. The children join to make sounds, feeling the vibrations, and

sharing their space. Rhythm exploration is important in development of many later academic skills such as recognizing patterns. The movements of making the sounds provides a gross motor activity to assist in the production of purposeful movements and body awareness. Another musical experience the Yellow Ducks experience daily is singing simple songs. The repetition of simple rhyming songs influences early verbal communication skills and very early foundation of reading skills. The biggest benefit of music is the smiles and fun the children experience as they express themselves by allowing their bodies to move to the music.

In transition of music the children also expressed themselves artistically through painting fall trees. Ms. Leslie guided the children through their paintings by using the technique of hand- over- hand if

needed. The children used their whole hand to paint colorful fall leaves using pieces of crumpled up tin foil. The new method of painting using the tin foil as their painting instrument and a whole hand and arm movements like banging on the drum allowed for a new experience. The early stages of exploration and purposeful movements are so important in the children's overall individual development.

Overall, the Yellow Ducks had a wonderful and musical month of September. We incorporated many aspects of development while sharing smiles and having fun. As a class we will continue to add to our musical experiences and explore new methods of creativity. This continuous exploration will assist in the formation of communication skills, problem- solving, and the development of original thoughts. To best assist the Parrots in learning their colors, we encouraged them to use their fingers and hands to mix paints on the table, mix food coloring with shaving cream, and enjoy sensory bins containing materials like feathers and water beads. Using their fingers and hands to complete the mentioned activities not only builds fine motor strength but completing activities as a class teaches the toddlers how to participate constructively in



group situations, When participating constructivel y in a group, the toddlers practice important life-long skills such as regulating their emotions and solving social

problems by using their words.

We continued learning colors by enjoying two special snacks together:
Rainbow Goldfish and Fruit Loops. During these two snacks, the toddlers practiced recognizing their colors, verbalizing the colors, and sorting the colors. Building our vocal language is a skill we are always working on as emergent speakers!
Recognizing and sorting colors is a cognitive skill that is more focused on in preschool, but several of our Parrots impressed us with their emerging abilities! Coming up next, we can't wait to fully submerge ourselves into Fall!
