We practiced our scissoring skills to cut rectangles, triangles, and circles. The Frogs then used these shapes to create trees to begin our forest. The Frogs were also very excited to include our Family Trees to enhance the forest.

We began to fill our forest with furry friends – one of which was a raccoon. The Frogs again practiced scissoring when they cut out heads for their raccoons; they each individually embellished their animals face with the finishing touches of googly eyes and smiley faces. Patterning was introduced while putting together the furry, black and white tails.

The next animal friend we had the joy of learning about was a squirrel. Each Frog designed the face of their squirrel to their liking with markers. Our fine motor skills were put to work when using the pincher grip on a marker and cutting the triangle-shaped ears. Then, they rolled construction paper around a pencil which made the perfect curly, bushy tail for their forest

creature. With every forest animal we were introduced to, we were also introduced to its beginning letter. We did this as a class during circle time which gave us great opportunities to interact with our friends and encourage each other with newer letter sounds.

In preparation for the spooky Halloween party, we added bats and spiders to our forest. In introducing math concepts, we counted out eight legs for our creepy

crawling spiders, we attached pipe cleaners (legs) to the spider and embellished with googly eyes. We also worked on math while making the wings for our bats. Using our knowledge of shapes, the Frogs cut a circle in half, making two semi circles. These semi circles were added to a full circle to form the wings of our bats. PURPLE PARROTS

The Purple Parrots enjoyed an October full of new fall sensory experiences! We encouraged the toddlers to learn by using their fingers and hands to explore new materials, textures, and substances. So that's just what we did!

We began the month by playing in faux leaves, making puffy pumpkin paint, and using cinnamon scented paint. The toddlers tried stamping with painted apples and were able to shuck corn to paint with as well! We washed pumpkins in soapy water, stuck cotton balls onto ghosts, and even played in pumpkin guts! Towards the end of the month, we were able to enlist the toddlers to help us collect fall leaves and pinecones from the playground that we added to our sensory bin.

As the toddlers are exploring, we as teachers label and describe the new things they're experiencing to help expand their expressive vocabulary. This descriptive language can be used for an occurrence as simple as a toddler excitedly holding up a leaf from the sensory bin. We then say, "Oh wow, it's a leaf! That leaf is brown. That leaf is crunchy and hard!" We support the toddlers in hearing as much expressive and descriptive language as possible. The toddlers tend to repeat the new vocabulary they're hearing, helping them to speak clearly and learn the social rules of language, like eye contact and pausing at the proper times to let the other person speak.

Besides building vocabulary, the toddlers gain strength in their fingers, hands, wrists and forearms by using their fine motor skills exploring new materials. The toddlers also learn more about the world around them and the characteristics of Earth's environment/nature. We are looking forward to a November full of more exploration and discovery!

The small playground is a great environment for the Yellow Ducks to be able to spread out and explore their own abilities of movement. Our Creative Curriculum supports a child's abilities at all stages of development. This is very beneficial for the Yellow Ducks classroom because there is a significant amount of physical development occurring in the first fifteen months of age.

The teachers provide a variety of gross-motor skill equipment in the classroom such as the climbing mats, the jumping zebra, the large drum, the tunnel, and all the tummy time a child need. We also have many options for gross motor play outside with our large climbing hippo, the toddler approved ramp, small playhouses, and the jungle gym with slide. All the equipment promotes different skill levels and different muscle groups for the children to support. There is also lots of free space, this space is very important in the development of movement and gross motor skills because it



allows a child to move their body and to learn how their body moves within their abilities. The Yellow Ducks will continue to work our large muscle groups

as we head into the colder months by utilizing all the space inside of the building such as walking up and down the hallway or using the large rainbow tumble mat.

In addition to our month of movement, the Yellow Ducks celebrated Halloween with a very fun party. The little Duckies



looked so cute in their costumes as we paraded around the building with all the big kids. We also enjoyed a ghostly snack with the help of the children.

Each child used their fingers, or a

popsicle stick to spread the white icing onto a graham cracker and then with assistance the black eyes and mouth was added.
