Christmas Traditions

Did you know that the children gain many skills by participating in our holiday show? It's not just about putting on a great show for the parents, grandparents, and neighbors – the children are actually learning lifelong skills too! As reported by OpenMicUK, "learning to sing as a child causes the brain to perform multiple tasks at once. This helps to develop the memory: from memorizing lyrics to remembering a cue to start singing, the brain learns to be able to handle more tasks and is required to perform them simultaneously. Singing also encourages deep breathing, getting more oxygen to the brain which helps with natural development, emotional well being and concentration. Singing provides children with practical examples of concepts such as fast and slow to loud and quiet.

Engaging with (singing and listening to) music can improve the mood of the child, thus supporting a healthy emotional state.

It's not just the brain either. Singing and playing music are physical activities requiring the development of key muscles including the core. This makes children stronger and healthier, understanding how

to properly use the diaphragm and lungs."

So as you can see, your children are working on many skills while practicing for the big performance! Performing in front of such a large group can also help your preschooler gain confidence and overcome anxieties about large groups, enabling them to lead large groups of employees later in life with ease! We all look forward to showcasing the Green Frogs, Orange Owls and Blue Gills at this performance!

While the holiday show is our tradition to kick-off the Christmas season, our center-wide pajama day is another of our favorite traditions. GREEN FROGS

Fine motor strength and coordination was the focus of our month in the Green Frogs room. Using a variety of board games and manipulatives, the Frogs were able to enhance these skills in a fun and meaningful way. Play-Doh is not only one of the Frogs favorite activities, it is also one of the best activities to increase a young child's finger strength and coordination. The Frogs use their fingertips, palms, and knuckles as they carefully knead and shape their Play-Doh into various creations. Various tools can also be added during Play-Doh time to improve the Frogs dexterity such as cookie cutters, rolling pins, scissors, and eating utensils. Tongs are a tool that we use daily at Kid Country and many of our young learners struggle to master the pincer grip needed to properly use tongs. To help strengthen our pincer grip, we brought several pairs of tongs into our classroom and asked the Frogs to pick up small toy bugs that were lying in a basket beneath criss-crossed ribbons. This activity not only challenges the Frogs fine motor skills, but also encourages them to think critically as they try to find the best way to retrieve the bugs. Fine motor strength is easy to work on at home as well! Using scissors, colored pencils, tweezers, and Play-Doh are all simple activities that help to engage the small, but mighty, muscles! Gobble Gobble! It was turkey time in the Frogs room as we worked together to create turkeys to adorn our classroom walls. To make our turkeys really pop, we used a variety of art mediums including paint, paper, and tissue paper. We also enjoyed celebrating the Thanksgiving holiday with our Green Frogs family during our Thanksgiving feast. We welcomed our Red Robins friends to the classroom to partake in a delicious meal prepared by our very own Ms. Krissy. During this meal, the children

To end the week, we read one of our favorite books, *Will Bear Share?* By Hilary Leung. As a large group, we practiced sharing by sitting in a circle and encouraging the children to pass a large stuffed football to the child next to them. It delighted the toddlers to receive such a "special gift" from their classmate!

Sharing is a difficult concept for toddlers to grasp, and for good reason. Even our oldest toddlers are only at the beginning developmental stages of noticing others' feelings. But talking about sharing and using gentle hands helps our toddlers begin to recognize and identify emotions such as happiness and sadness. We will say, "You gave your toy to ___! Look at how happy he/she is! He/she is smiling!" or "Ouch, you hurt ___! He/she is crying! He/she is sad!". Being able to recognize the emotions of others and respond appropriately to emotional cues are skills that will follow our little toddlers through adulthood. As their social-emotional growth increases within the next couple of years, they will be able to make and sustain friendships with their peers. YELLOW DUCKS

The Yellow Ducks focused on the development of their visual perception during the month of November. During our October in-service the teachers attended a training provided by BDI Playhouse about the importance of functional vision. Visual perception is how the brain interprets what the eyes see and is very important in everyday skills for any age. The Yellow Ducks teachers joined together to create more opportunities to strengthen and encourage the children's visual perceptions.

The first skills we contributed into our free-play time were sensory processing and visual attention. In order to execute this appropriately the infant teachers isolated the toys the children were interacting with to assist in the focus of the play at hand. For example, Ms. Emily borrowed the barn from the toddler classroom and placed the bin of animals and

people on each side. We placed it in the middle of the classroom away from the other options of toys for this interaction. The teachers were able to isolate the animals and people and model how

they relate to the barn as well as identifying each animal. We will continue to research and utilize all resources to build on our opportunities to strengthen the children's sensory processing and visual attention.

Another huge factor in our daily lives in the infant classroom is tummy time which engages a child's oculomotor skills; how the eyes move. The combination of core strength and the direction in which the eyes move are

incorporated into a productive tummy time session. The teachers engaged in a group activity of rolling a ball back and forth while everyone was on their tummy. The children and the teachers laid on their stomachs to push or roll the ball to each other to incorporate several visual and core skills, while having fun.

Overall, the Yellow Ducks had a visually enhancing month of November filled with
